## 100. General Regulations & Policies

In accordance with Article 9 of the Bylaws, the following general regulations, policies and procedures governing the FHSAA Track & Field Program have been approved by the Board of Directors. They apply to all regular season contests as well as the FHSAA State Series unless otherwise modified or superseded by the terms and conditions approved for the state series. Substantive changes for the 2006-07 school year are shaded.

[The FHSAA utilizes a standardized calendar in which the weeks of the year are numbered. This ensures consistent dates from year to year. Week 1 begins with the first Sunday in July. Thanksgiving always falls in Week 21.]

### **101. Important Dates**

Thursday, February 1 (Week 31)-Friday, February 23 (Week 34) – Online rules presentation available in E-Classroom on FHSAA.org.

Monday, January 22 (Week 30) – First practice date for Class 1A and Class 2A schools.

Monday, January 29 (Week 31) – First practice date for Class 3A and Class 4A schools.

Monday, February 19 (Week 34) – First regular season competition date for Class 1A and Class 2A schools.

Monday, February 26 (Week 35) – First regular season competition date for Class 3A and Class 4A schools.

Saturday, March 31 (Week 39) – Last date on which a student may transfer and represent a Class 1A or Class 2A school in the 2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series.

Monday, April 2 (Week 40) – 2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series Official Entry List(s) for Class 1A and Class 2A must be submitted to district meet manager.

Saturday, April 7 (Week 40) – Last date on which a student may transfer and represent a Class 3A or Class 4A school in the 2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series; last regular season competition date for Class 1A and Class 2A schools.

Monday, April 9 (Week 41) – 2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series Official Entry List(s) for Class 3A and Class 4A must be submitted to district meet manager.

Monday-Saturday, April 9-14 (Week 41) - Class 1A and Class 2A district meets.

Saturday, April 14 (Week 41) – Last regular season competition date for Class 3A and Class 4A schools.

Monday-Saturday, April 16-21 (Week 42) - Class 3A and Class 4A district meets.

Wednesday-Friday, April 18-20 (Week 42) - Class 1A and Class 2A regional meets.

Wednesday-Friday, April 25-27 (Week 43) - Class 3A and Class 4A regional meets.

Friday, April 27 (Week 43) – FHSAA Track & Field Finals presented by MF Athletic Class 1A state championship meet.

Saturday, April 28 (Week 43) – FHSAA Track & Field Finals presented by MF Athletic Class 2A state championship meet.

Friday, May 4 (Week 44) – FHSAA Track & Field Finals presented by MF Athletic Class 3A state championship meet.

Saturday, May 5 (Week 44) – FHSAA Track & Field Finals presented by MF Athletic Class 4A state championship meet.

## 102. Eligibility of Student-Athletes

**102.01** Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaw 11, as well as guidelines, regulations, policies and procedures governing student eligibility that have been adopted by the Board of Directors, may represent member schools in interscholastic competition. In accordance with Bylaw 11.13.1, member schools are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before they participate and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all interscholastic competition. See FHSAA.org for FHSAA student-eligibility guidelines.

**102.02** If an ineligible student-athlete is accidently or intentionally permitted to participate in an interscholastic contest, forfeit of the contest and honors shall be automatic and mandatory.

#### 103. Season and Contest Limitations

**103.01 Practice.** First practice date for Class 1A and Class 2A schools is Monday of Week 30 (Jan. 22, 2007); last practice is Saturday of Week 43 (April 28, 2007). First practice date for Class 3A and Class 4A schools is Monday of Week 31 (Jan. 29, 2007); last practice is Saturday of Week 44 (May 5, 2007).

No practice session of any kind may be held on a Sunday.

- **103.02 Contests.** First regular season contest date for Class 1A and Class 2A schools is Monday of Week 34 (Feb. 19, 2007); last regular season contest date is Saturday of Week 40 (Apr. 7, 2007). First regular season contest date for Class 3A and Class 4A schools is Monday of Week 35 (Feb. 26, 2007); last regular season contest date is Saturday of Week 41 (Apr. 14, 2007).
  - (1) Maximum number of regular season contests 13.
- (2) Maximum number of contests in a school week -3. No more than one school day or part of one school day may be missed in a week for traveling to, traveling from and participating in an athletic contest(s).
- (3) No contest of any kind may be held on a Sunday except under emergency conditions in tournaments or meets that are approved by the Commissioner or the Board of Directors.
- (4) Meets must be completed in one (1) day unless the second day of the meet is not a school day. This provision may be waived by the Commissioner to accommodate meets held as part of the FHSAA State Series.
- **103.03 Opponents.** Member schools shall compete only against schools that are full or affiliate members of the FHSAA, or out-of-state schools that are members of associations that regulate interscholastic athletic competition within their respective states. Out-of-state schools, however, must have eligibility guidelines comparable to those of the FHSAA, and must have an established season of competition in the sport that is concurrent with that of the FHSAA. Competition with out-of-state schools, in some cases, may require the approval of the NFHS. See FHSAA.org for NFHS regulations on interstate and international competitions.
- **103.04 Contracts.** The "Contract for Interscholastic Athletic Contest" (Form AT1) is required for all regular season contests.

Practice meets, exhibition meets, non-contract meets and scrimmage meets with other schools, groups, alumni or league teams are strictly prohibited. All such meets or sessions shall be on an intra-squad basis. Non-squad members shall not participate in any team practice, match or contest.

**103.05 Student-Athletes.** Maximum number of regular season contests -13, inclusive of all meets conducted on the varsity and sub-varsity levels. Maximum number of contests in a week -3. No more than one school day or part of one school day may be missed in a week for traveling to, traveling from and participating in an athletic contest(s).

#### 104. Invitational Meets

- **104.01** All invitational meets (conference, county, league, etc.) involving three or more schools, or regular-season meets involving five or more schools, must have the approval of the FHSAA Office. The "Application for Approval of Multi-School Athletic Event" (Form AT3) must be submitted not less than 30 days in advance of the first day of the event to avoid a late fee of \$50. Approval forms received less than 10 days in advance of the first day of the tournament will incur a late fee of \$100, and forms received after the date of the event will incur a \$200 late fee. Contests or invitational tournaments hosted by middle schools, regardless of the number of participating teams, do not require the approval of the FHSAA Office. No approval is required for regular season contests (dual, tri, quad, etc.) regardless of the number of participating teams.
- **104.02** No junior varsity, junior high or other sub-varsity team may participate in a meet or event involving a varsity team or individual competitor. Junior varsity, junior high and other sub-varsity competition, if held, must be held as separate meets or in separate divisions if in a combined meet.
- **104.03** The FHSAA shall receive eight (8) percent of the gross receipts of all invitational meets. Gross receipts include revenue derived from gate receipts and entry fees. The complete "FHSAA Financial Report Form for Invitational Meet, Football Jamboree and Postseason Football Bowl Game" (Form FN1) must be submitted by the host school so that it is received in the FHSAA Office, as well as by all participating schools, within three weeks (21 calendar days) of the event. Payment of profit shares due participating schools and the FHSAA must be included with the report. If the financial report is not received in the FHSAA Office within 30 calendar days, a late filing fee of \$50 will be assessed; within 60 days, \$75; and within 90 days, \$100. See FHSAA.org for "Guidelines on Filing of Financial Reports and Payment of Revenue Shares."
- **104.04** Certain invitational meets involving out-of-state schools may require the approval of the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). See FHSAA.org for NFHS regulations on interstate and international competitions.

## 105. Rules of Competition

- **105.01 Competition Rules.** NFHS Track & Field Rules, as modified by the FHSAA, are the official rules for all track and field meets. The following modifications to those rules have been adopted by the Board of Directors.
- 1-2-1 ORDER OF RUNNING EVENTS: All meets will be limited to the following running events to be contested in order as listed: Girls 4x800m relay, 100m high hurdles, 100m dash, 1600m run, 4x100m relay, 400m dash, 300m low hurdles, 800m run, 200m dash, 3200m run, 4x400m relay. Boys 4x800m relay, 110m high hurdles, 100m dash, 1600m run, 4x100m relay, 400m dash, 300m intermediate hurdles, 800m run, 200m dash, 3200m run, 4x400m relay. The 4x800m relay must be run during

field event competition.

- •1-2-2 Girls and boys track and field meets will be held concurrently. Girls running events must precede boys running events and must be run alternately.
- •1-2-3 ORDER OF FIELD EVENTS: All meets will be limited to the following field events: Girls pole vault, shot put, high jump, long jump, triple jump, discus. Boys discus, long jump, triple jump, shot put, pole vault and high jump.
- 4-2-1, 2 PARTICIPATION AND ENTRY LIMITATIONS: No student may enter or participate in more than four (4) events in any one meet, only three (3) of which may be running events. A relay event is a running event. Participation in the preliminaries of any event will count as an entry regardless of whether the student qualified for the finals in that event. If a student exceeds this limitation, the school which he/she represents must forfeit all points and places earned by the student in the meet, both individual points and places as well as those earned by any relay team on which the student was a member. No student may engage in exhibition or practice performances during a track and field meet. Only those students who are properly entered and eligible may participate in a track and field meet.
- 4-3-1 UNIFORMS: Competitors may wear a one-piece (singlet) or two-piece track & field uniform issued by the school. A male competitor must wear his jersey inside his shorts at all times. A female competitor must wear her jersey inside her shorts at all times, unless her jersey is designed to be worn outside the shorts. Jerseys designed to be worn outside the shorts must hang below the waistband of the shorts when standing erect. Competitors in violation of this rule will not be permitted to compete. The enforcement of this rule is the responsibility of the starter or event judge, but the ultimate responsibility for wearing the proper uniform rests with the team coach. Each contestant must be numbered on the back of his/her jersey with numerals of color that contrast with the color of the jersey and is not less than three-quarters (3/4) inch wide. The number must be at least six inches high. Contestants on the same team may not wear identical numbers. However, athletes from the same school participating in the same event must wear identical uniforms. Headbands which are no more than two (2) inches wide and made of non-abrasive, unadorned cloth, elastic, fiber, soft leather, or rubber are permissable. Hair-restraining devices no more than two (2) inches made of soft material are legal. Decorative headwear is prohibited. Commercial advertising, with the exception of the manufacturer's logo, is prohibited on all athletic uniforms. All jewelry, with the exception of wristwatches, is prohibited.
- 3-2-4(a) SHOES: The Games Committee has the authority to determine the length of spikes used on all-weather surfaces. Track spikes may not exceed one-half (1/2) inch in length when measured from the sole to the tip of the spike.
- **105.02 Event Regulations.** Events in all track meets will be run as follows.
- (1) Lane assignments in all races will be made according to the spearhead method. On a nine-lane track, the lane assignments will be 5-6, 4-7, 3-8, 2-9, and 1. On an eight-lane track, the lane assignments will be 4-5, 3-6, 2-7, and 1-8. On a six-lane track, the lane assignments will be 3-4, 2-5 and 1-6. When assigning lanes to qualifiers from preliminary heats to finals, the heat winners will be assigned to lanes 5 and 6 on a nine-lane track, lanes 4 and 5 on an eight-lane track, and lanes 3 and 4 on a six-lane track. The remaining contestants will be seeded and assigned lanes by time.
  - (2) The 400m Dash will be run in two or more sections. Each contestant must

remain in his/her starting lane the entire distance.

- (3) The 800m Run will be run in two sections with a staggered start around the first turn, followed by a break for the pole on the back straight-away.
- (4) The 1600m Run and 3200m Run each will be conducted in one section with a staggered start around the first turn, followed by a break for the pole on the back straight-away.
- (5) The 4x400m Relay will be run from a staggered start. The first runner must stay in his/her lane the entire distance with the first exchange being made in the assigned lane. The second runner must remain in the assigned lane through the first curve, after which he/she may break for the pole on the back straight-away.
- (6) For running events consisting of preliminaries and finals, the final must be run in one race.
- (7) Protests will not be allowed. In the organization and administration of meets, the decisions of the judges or the Jury of Appeals will be final. The referee must not be included as a member of the Jury of Appeals.
  - (8) Noisemakers of all types are prohibited at all meets.
- (9) An athlete who is disqualified from an event due to unsportsmanlike conduct shall be disqualified from further competition in the meet as well as a minimum of the next seven days and two meets.
  - (10) National Federation Rule 2 shall be followed in scoring all meets.
- (11) National Federation Rule 5-7-1, -2 and -3 verbal starting commands shall be followed in all meets.
- **105.03 Athletic Uniforms.** Commercial advertising, with the exception of the manufacturer's logo as permitted by NFHS rules, is prohibited on all athletic uniforms.
- **105.04 Suspended Contest.** A suspended contest shall be resumed from the point of interruption. Otherwise, NFHS Rules regarding the resumption of suspended contests will apply.
- **105.05 Protests.** Protests of interscholastic contests shall not be allowed. The decision of the officials shall be final. The outcome (i.e. winners and losers) of all interscholastic contests are final, and cannot be reversed, except where the rules of the sport permit or in the case where a winner must forfeit its victory or points.
- **105.06 Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs).** It is strongly recommended that an automated external defibrillator (AED) be present and available for use if needed at the site of every interscholastic athletic contest conducted uring the preseason and regular season in which member schools participate.

## 106. Sportsmanship and Unsportsmanlike Conduct

**106.01 Sportsmanship.** Student-athletes, coaches, administrators, spectators and all other persons connected directly or indirectly with a member school, as well as contest officials, shall adhere to the principles of good sportsmanship and the ethics of competition before, during and after all contests in which they participate and/or attend.

Each participating school shall be held strictly accountable for unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of its competitors, coaches and spectators.

If contestants or people from any school are found guilty of carelessness or maliciously breaking, damaging or destroying property or equipment belonging to the host school or host organization, such school will be held responsible for costs incurred in replacing or repairing such property or equipment.

## 106.02 Disqualification (ejection) for general unsportsmanlike conduct or flagrant foul.

- (1) **Student-Athlete.** Suspended from competition for remainder of contest and all contests on all levels for the following seven days, but not less than the next two regularly scheduled contests (one contest in boys football); if last contest of season, suspension is served in the next sport in which the student-athlete participates; beginning with fourth such ejection in a sport, program in that sport is placed on administrative probation and school is assessed a \$100 fine per occurrence in that sport.
- (2) **Coach.** Suspended from competition for remainder of contest and all contests on all levels for the following seven days, but not less than the next two regularly scheduled contests (one contest in boys football); if last contest of season, suspension is served in the next sport in which the individual coaches; school is assessed a minimum fine of \$100 per occurrence.

# 106.03 Disqualification (ejection) for gross unsportsmanlike conduct (Bylaw 11.11.2), or second or subsequent act of general unsportsmanlike conduct or flagrant foul.

- (1) **Student-Athlete.** Suspended from competition for remainder of contest and all contests on all levels for up to a period of six weeks; if last contest of season, suspension is served in the next sport in which the student-athlete participates; beginning with second such ejection in any sport, school is assessed a \$250 fine per occurrence.
- (2) **Coach.** Suspended from competition for remainder of contest and all contests on levels for up to a period of six weeks; if last contest of season, suspension is served in the next sport in which the individual coaches; school is assessed a minimum fine of \$100 per occurrence.

## 106.04 Restrictions on Disqualified Coach.

- (1) Must immediately leave the competition area to a place where he/she is not visible to student-athletes, officials, spectators or other coaches and where he/she cannot see the competition itself.
- (2) Must not have any further contact with or give instruction to student-athletes or other members of his/her staff for the remainder of the contest; including halftime intermission; breaks between sessions, periods or innings; and post-contest activities.
- (3) Shall not attend any subsequent contest from which he/she has been suspended in any capacity; shall not be present at the site; and shall not accompany his/her team to the site of the contest.
- **106.05 Enforcement.** It is the responsibility of local school authorities to ensure this policy is enforced. When an ineligible student-athlete is allowed to participate, forfeiture of the points earned is mandatory. When a coach is allowed to coach in a contest from which he/she has been suspended, the school shall face additional penalties. When a coach is disqualified (ejected) from a contest and no other authorized school personnel are present to take charge of the student-athletes, the contest shall be forfeited. Contest officials, or host schools for contests in sports in which there are no registered officials, must report acts of unsportsmanlike conduct to the FHSAA Office using Form AT6 or iFHSAA.
- **106.06 Additional Penalties.** In addition to the standard monetary penalty of \$100 for the disqualification (ejection) of a coach, a school may be assessed

additional minimum fines for unsportsmanlike conduct by the coach or other school personnel as follows:

- Use of profanity or gutter language \$150.00
- Continuing to give instruction to student-athletes or other members of the coaching staff after having been disqualified from a contest \$150.00
- Pursuit of officials following a contest \$150.00
- Refusal to leave the court, playing field or team area following disqualification \$100.00
- Physical contact with an official \$250.00
- Removal of a team or individual from an athletic contest prior to its normal conclusion \$250.00

**106.07 Public Criticism of Officials.** No coach or other school employee may publicly criticize or berate an official prior to, during or following a contest. Professional ethics require that coaches and other school employees use proper channels to report their complaints about officials rather than airing them publicly. A minimum fine of \$50 shall be assessed a school whose coach or other employees are in violation of this provision.

#### 106.08 Crowd Control.

- (1) The home school administration is responsible for the control of spectators during a contest. The presence of uniformed officers is recommended.
- (2) The visiting school administration is encouraged to assist with the control of its own spectators. Visiting school administrators (i.e., principal, FHSAA representative, assistant principals and athletic director) who are required by their principal to attend the event for supervisory purposes upon presentation of a photo I.D. must be provided complimentary admission to the event, provided the visiting school submits their names to the home school administration by fax in writing on school stationery not less than 24 hours prior to the scheduled starting time of the event.
- (3) The officials assigned to officiate a contest are responsible for the conduct of the contest itself. In the event, however, a spectator or group of spectators interferes with the conduct of a contest or causes an official to become distracted through continual, unrelenting verbal abuse, the official should immediately stop the action and report the spectator or group of spectators to the home school administration or the nearest uniformed security officer and ask that they be restrained or removed from the facility. If the home school administration or uniformed security officer is unwilling or unable to comply and the official does not believe the contest can be safely continued, the official must declare the contest ended at that point. Under no circumstance should an official ever confront, challenge, rebuke or threaten a spectator, or make gestures of any kind toward a spectator before, during or after a contest.
- (4) The officials assigned to officiate a contest and the home school administration are required to file with the FHSAA Office by fax within 24 hours a written report on any contest that is disrupted or terminated due to interference by a spectator(s).

#### 106.09 Banned Substances.

(1) The use of alcohol, tobacco or tobacco-like products by student-athletes, coaches and officials is prohibited during any interscholastic athletic contest and in the vicinity of the playing field or court. A student-athlete in violation of this policy is guilty of gross unsportsmanlike conduct, will be disqualified from the contest and shall be suspended from subsequent contests in accordance with the provisions of s. 106.03(1). The official must report any violation of this policy by either a student-athlete or coach to the FHSAA Office. Violation of this policy by a student-athlete

or coach shall subject the school to a monetary penalty. Violation of this policy by an official shall subject the official to a monetary penalty or suspension or both. For violations of this policy, a minimum fine of \$100.00 shall be assessed.

(2) The use of anabolic steroids or other performance-enhancing drugs by a student-athlete is not permissible and is considered to be an act of gross unsportsmanlike conduct. A student-athlete discovered to be using such substances shall be ineligible to compete in any interscholastic contest until such time as medical evidence can be presented that the student's system is free of those substances.

#### 107. Inclement Weather Procedures

- **107.01** If a severe thunderstorm or electrical storm occurs in the area prior to the start of or during any outdoor contest, the officials must immediately contact the principal or his/her designee of each school involved in the contest to determine if the contest should be played as scheduled, delayed, suspended or postponed. If the principal or his/her designee of either of the schools involved requests that the contest be interrupted or postponed, the officials must immediately honor such request. If the principal or his/her designee of only one of the competing schools is available, his/her request must be honored.
- (1) The safety and welfare of all concerned is of paramount importance. In no case shall an official deny a request by a principal to delay, suspend or postpone an outdoor contest due to inclement weather or imply that the contest will be forfeited as a result of such a request.
- (2) A suspended contest shall be resumed from the point of interruption. Otherwise, NFHS Rules regarding the resumption of suspended contests shall apply.

## 108. Filming, Videotaping, Photographing Contests

**108.01** A visiting school may film, videotape or photograph its team's or contestants' performance in a contest when permission is secured from and arrangements are made with the host school principal. Videographers and their equipment must be positioned so that they do not block the view of any spectator. No representative of a school that is not participating in a contest may film, videotape or photograph all or any part of the contest unless permission to do so is granted by the principal of each school that is participating in the contest.

**108.02** Any school violating this policy is guilty of unsportsmanlike conduct and shall be subject to reprimand and the assessment of a financial penalty by the FHSAA.

#### 109. Officials

Each host school shall be responsible for securing officials for the meets that it hosts, and for negotiating with those officials for their compensation. A list of registered track & field officials is available at FHSAA.org.

# 200. State Series Terms & Conditions

In accordance with Article 9.8.0 of the FHSAA Bylaws, the following Terms and Conditions governing the 2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series have been approved by the FHSAA Board of Directors. Denarvise Thornton, administrator for track & field, shall be the state series director and Shanell Young, administrator for track & field, shall be the assistant director.

## 201. Team Entries 201.01 Eligibility.

- (1) Participation in the state series is voluntary and open to any full member senior high school varsity team provided:
- (a) The school's varsity team competes in a minimum of four (4) regular season varsity contests during the current season; and
- (b) The school files a commitment to participate in the state series with the FHSAA Office by the specified deadline.
  - (2) A school shall enter only one (1) girls team and/or one (1) boys team.
- (3) A new member school shall not be eligible to enter a team into the state series in its initial year of membership. A continuing member school that is starting a new program or resuming a previously discontinued program shall not be eligible to enter a team into the state series until the school successfully sponsors a varsity program for a minimum of one school year. These provisions shall not apply to newly opening traditional public high schools that join the Association in their initial two years of existence.

## 201.02 Commitment to Participate.

- (1) A member school that elects to participate in the state series in an individual sport must file with the FHSAA Office a declaration of intent to participate by the specified deadline. This declaration of intent to participate is an agreement between the member school and the Association, and obligates the school to participate in accordance with and abide by all guidelines, regulations, policies and procedures for the state series.
- (2) A school that does not declare its intent to participate in the state series by the specified deadline may be permitted to participate without penalty if its written request for entry is received before the state series assignments are released. Once the state series assignments are released, the school will be assigned and assessed a \$100 administrative fee if the request is received prior to the date for the district planning meeting. Thereafter, a school shall not be assigned.
- (3) A school that declares its intent to participate in the state series may be released from its commitment without penalty if written notice of its withdrawal is received in the FHSAA Office before the state series assignments are released. Once the state series assignments are released, the following provisions will apply:

- (a) If the school notifies the FHSAA Office in writing of its withdrawal prior to or on the date for filing the official entry list, the school will be released without penalty.
- (b) If the school notifies the FHSAA Office in writing of its withdrawal after the date for filing the official entry list, or fails to notify the FHSAA Office in writing and does not appear for the district tournament/meet, the school, at a minimum, will be assessed a \$250 fine

## 202. Student-Athlete Entries 202.01 Eligibility.

- (1) To represent a member school in the state series, a student-athlete:
- (a) Must be eligible under Bylaw 11 and applicable administrative guidelines, regulations, policies and procedures.
- (b) Must participate in a minimum of four (4) interscholastic contests in the sport during the regular season.
- (c) Must be enrolled in and in regular attendance at the school for which it will participate prior to Saturday, Mar. 31, 2007 for Class 1A and 2A schools, and Saturday, Apr. 7, 2007 for Class 3A and 4A schools.
- (d) Must be submitted to the district tournament/meet host on the school's official entry list.
- (2) Girls only may participate in the girls division of the state series. Boys only may participate in the boys division of the state series.

### 202.02 Official Entry List.

- (1) Each participating school must generate in iFHSAA and submit by fax to its district meet manager a "2007 FHSAA State Track & Field Series Official Entry List" on which is listed the name of each student-athlete who will represent the school in the state series. The official entry list:
- (a) Must be filed by 5 p.m. Monday, Apr. 2, 2007 for Class 1A and 2A schools, and by 5 p.m. Monday, Apr. 9, 2007 for Class 3A and 4A schools (late filing fee is \$50, increases to \$100 if not received by district meet manager by 5 p.m. Friday, Apr. 6, 2007 for Class 1A and Class 2A schools, or by 5 p.m. Friday, Apr. 13, 2007 for Class 3A and Class 4A schools).
- (b) All student-athletes listed must have been previously reported to the FHSAA Office through iFHSAA.
  - (c) Must be signed by the principal, FHSAA representative and head coach.
  - (d) Cannot be e-mailed.
- (2) A school whose official entry list is not received by the time designated for the seeding meeting to determine the heat and flight assignments of teams and individuals in the district meet may be permitted to participate only with the approval of the FHSAA Office; however, that school shall be assessed a minimum financial penalty of \$250. This penalty will increase if it is later determined that a student-athlete(s) representing the school was ineligible to do so.
- (3) Additions/changes to an official entry list must be submitted in writing to the district meet manager using Form AT8. A coach making a change to his/her official entry list must declare that the student affected in the addition or change is otherwise eligible by all FHSAA policies and bylaws; appears on his/her school's annual eligibility list in the iFHSAA database, and meets all minimum contest requirements as

established by the Association. The following provisions will apply:

- (a) An administrative fee of \$50 per addition or change will be assessed. The fee(s) will appear on the school's next monthly statement.
- (b) Requests for additions or changes are permissible until the time designated for the seeding meeting to determine the heat and flight assignments of teams and individuals in the district meet. Once the seeding meeting begins, no additions/changes may be made, with the exception of changes of relay team members that qualify from the District Meets to the Regional/State Meets and from the Regional Meets to the State Meets.
- (4) The district meet manager shall forward to the FHSAA Office via U.S. Mail all list change forms (AT8) filed by schools participating in the district meet within 10 business days of the conclusion of the district meet.

#### 203. School Classification

The classification of each school participating in the state series is determined on the basis of student population in the ninth through 12th grades as reported to the FHSAA Office in October 2004. Student populations for schools that do not have all four grades are adjusted in accordance with policy. Student populations for schools that enroll girls or boys only are doubled for classification purposes. There are four classifications as follows:

- Class 4A schools with populations of 2,171 or more students;
- Class 3A schools with populations of 1,563 to 2,170 students;
- Class 2A schools with populations of 493 to 1,562 students; and
- Class 1A schools with populations of 492 or fewer students.

Classification assignments are available on FHSAA.org.

#### 204. Districts

**204.01 Assignment.** Participating schools are geographically assigned to one of 16 district complexes (see FHSAA.org). A meet shall be conducted in each district complex at the conclusion of the regular season to determine the teams and individual competitors who shall represent the district complex in the remainder of the state series.

**204.02 District Coordinator.** One school in each district complex has been designated as the district coordinator (see state series assignments on FHSAA.org). The FHSAA representative or his/her designee at the district coordinator school shall be responsible for hosting, conducting and reporting to the FHSAA Office results of the district meeting. The meet manager is responsible for all aspects of the district meet upon conclusion of the district planning meeting and receipt of the meeting's minutes.

## 204.03 District Meeting.

- (1) Each district coordinator must conduct a district meeting on Monday, Jan. 8, 2007. The meeting must be held at a time so that all schools in the district can have a representative present with no loss of time from school. Exceptions to this policy must be made in writing to the Commissioner.
- (2) The district coordinator must notify in writing the FHSAA representative, athletic director, girls track & field coach and boys track & field coach of each school in his/her district of the site and time of the district meeting at least seven (7) days prior

to the date of the meeting. If, however, the FHSAA representative, athletic director, girls track & field coach or boys track & field coach at a given school has not received written notification from the district coordinator relative to the site and time of the district meeting, it is his/her responsibility to contact the district coordinator for the arrangements.

- (3) Each school in a district is required to have one voting representative present at the district meeting. All decisions will be made by a majority vote of those representatives present. There can be no voting by proxy. A school that fails to have a representative present at this meeting will be assessed a financial penalty of \$50.00.
  - (4) The following items of business must be addressed at the district meeting:
  - (a) Review FHSAA rules, policies, terms and conditions governing the FHSAA State Track & Field Series, including the FHSAA Licensing and Merchandising Policy.
  - (b) Select host school, site and determine time schedule. (Note: An actual host school must be selected at this meeting and may be subsequently changed only with the permission of the Commissioner.) The host school must be willing and able to use Hy-Tek Meet Manager for Windows software to conduct the District Meet, and should have a track with a synthetic or rubber surface.
  - (c) Set date and time for seeding meeting.
  - (d) Establish date and time for pre-meet coaches meeting at which heats and flights will be finalized. This meeting is not to be in lieu of the seeding meeting.
  - (e) Determine team awards to be ordered.
  - (f) Determine number of passes to be allowed competing teams.
  - (g) Determine financial arrangements. See Section 206 (Financial Terms).
  - (h) Determine the amount of compensation, not to exceed \$50.00, to be paid to the Meet Manager.
  - (i) Determine procedure for disseminating results to participating schools.
  - (j) Other business (i.e., AED availability, etc.).
- (5) The FHSAA Office will mail each district coordinator a form on which to record the decisions made during the district meeting. The report form should be completed and submitted along with minutes of the meeting to the FHSAA Office and each school in the district promptly following the meeting.
- **204.04 Regular Season District Competition.** Competition between schools assigned to a district is not required during the regular season.

#### 205. Meet Structure and Time Schedules

**205.01 Meet Series.** The successive meet series shall be designated respectively as district, regional and FHSAA Finals. Competition in the girls and boys divisions shall be conducted simultaneously.

#### 205.02 District Meets.

- (1) Dates, Time Schedule and Site.
- (a) <u>Dates.</u> Class 1A and 2A schools, Week 41 (Apr. 9-14, 2007); Class 3A and 4A schools, Week 42 (Apr. 16-21, 2007).
- (b) <u>Time Schedule.</u> Each district will determine the time schedule for its meet at the district meeting.
  - (c) <u>Site.</u> Each district will determine a site for its meet at the district meeting. The date and site of each district meet will be posted on FHSAA.org.

### 205.03 Regional Meets.

(1) **Complexes.** Competition will be conducted in four regional complexes in each classification. Districts 1 through 4 will comprise the Region 1 complex, Districts 5 through 8 the Region 2 complex, Districts 9 through 12 the Region 3 complex,

and Districts 13 through 16 the Region 4 complex. One meet will be conducted in each regional complex.

(2) **Dates and Time Schedule.** Regional meets shall be held Wednesday, April 18, Thursday, April 19 or Friday, April 20 (Week 42) for Class 1A and Class 2A schools, and Wednesday, April 25, Thursday, April 26 or Friday, April 27 for Class 3A and Class 4A schools (Week 43). The date of each regional meet will be posted on FHSAA.org.

(a) Time Schedule. Regional meets must adhere to the following time schedule:

#### 205.04 FHSAA Finals.

- (1) **Dates and Site.** The FHSAA Track & Field Finals presented by MF Athletic state meet shall be held at Showalter Field in Winter Park. Denarvise Thornton, FHSAA administrator for track & field, will be the meet director and Shanell Young, FHSAA administrator for track & field, will be the assistant director. The Class 1A meet will be held Friday, April 27; the Class 2A meet Saturday, April 28; the Class 3A meet Friday, May 4; and the Class 4A meet Saturday, May 5.
- (2) **Time Schedule.** The FHSAA Finals will be run according to the following time schedule:

(3) **Coaches Meeting.** A meeting for head coaches of schools with participating teams or individuals shall be conducted at 10:30 a.m. on the competition date at the host site. Each school entering a team or individual in the FHSAA Finals must be represented at this meeting by both the head girls coach and head boys coach. Schools that fail to have representation at the meeting shall be assessed a monetary penalty of \$50. Technical guidelines presented at the coaches' meeting will take precedence over those stated in the manual.

#### 205.05 Advancement of Teams and Individuals.

- (1) **District Meet to Regional Meet.** The first four placing individuals or relay teams in each district meet shall advance to the regional meet to which they are assigned. All ties which would result in more than four qualifiers in an event advancing to the regional meet must be broken by a run-off, throw-off or jump-off, or appropriate National Federation tie-breaker procedure.
- (2) **Regional Meet to FHSAA Finals.** The first four placing individuals or relay teams in each regional meet shall advance to the FHSAA Finals. All ties which would result in more than four qualifiers in an event advancing to the FHSAA Finals must be broken by a run-off, throw-off or jump-off, or appropriate National Federation tie-breaker procedure.
- **205.06 Local Management.** The FHSAA representative of the host school will be the local manager for the state series meet that his/her school is hosting.

He/she will be responsible for making the necessary preparations to host the meet and for the filing of necessary reports to the FHSAA Office upon conclusion of the meet.

The local manager must submit to both the FHSAA Office and the next level meet manager the results of the meet that his/her school hosted. These results must be transmitted using Hy-Tek Meet Manager for Windows software. The first and last names of each participant, together with their recorded times (manual or FAT), must be provided. These results must be submitted within 48 hours of the conclusion of the meet, and must be made available to the participating schools. The local manager also must forward to the next level meet manager by fax or overnight delivery photocopies of the official entry lists for all schools participating in the meet. Original copies of the official entry lists must be mailed to the FHSAA Office by district meet managers. Results may be e-mailed to the FHSAA Office at "track@fhsaa.org". The FHSAA Office will supply each local manager with the appropriate phone numbers and fax numbers.

The regional meet director must also provide by fax the first and last names of six relay participants for each school who qualifies on a relay team to the FHSAA Finals. Form TR1 may be used for this purpose. These names will be used in preparing participant passes to the FHSAA Finals. The coach will not be limited to these individuals in designating relay personnel at the FHSAA Finals. Coaches must identify relay participants who do not qualify to individual events. Those not so identified must purchase a ticket of admission to the meet. This report must be completed and submitted within 48 hours of the conclusion of the meet. The FHSAA office will supply each regional meet director with the appropriate fax numbers.

#### 206. Financial Terms

#### 206.01 District Meets.

- (1) **Admission.** \$5.00.
- (2) **Division of Receipts.** The host school shall retain 85 percent of the gross gate receipts from which it shall pay all expenses related to the event. The remaining 15 percent shall be paid to the FHSAA.

By unanimous vote of those representatives present at the district meeting the terms of s.206.01(2) may be set aside and the net profit, less the 15 percent share due the FHSAA, or net loss greater than \$350 incurred by a district meet, pro-rated among participating schools. If the vote is not unanimous, the terms of s.206.01(2) must be followed.

### 206.02 Regional Meets.

- (1) **Admission.** \$6.00.
- (2) **Division of Receipts.** The host school shall retain 85 percent of the gross gate receipts from which it shall pay all expenses related to the event. The remaining 15 percent shall be paid to the FHSAA.

#### 206.03 FHSAA Finals.

- (1) **Admission.** \$8.00.
- (2) **Division of Receipts.** No reimbursement of any kind will be paid to schools which qualify teams and/or individual contestants to the FHSAA Finals. Neither the FHSAA nor the host organization will assume responsibility for any participating school or individual contestant expenses of any kind.

#### 206.04 Financial Policies.

- (1) Admission prices as stated shall be charged by the host school for the state series events for which it serves as host <u>unless waived in writing by the Commissioner or his/her designee in advance of the event</u>.
- (2) Numbered tickets shall be sold, must be torn in half by ticket takers so that they cannot be resold, and must be accounted for in the ticket manifest section of the financial report form that is to be completed and submitted to the FHSAA Office. The local manager must furnish the tickets to be sold for admission to the state series event which his/her school serves as host.
- (3) If a state series event on the district or regional level shows a net profit of \$250 or less, the host school shall retain the net profit and no percentage shall be paid to the visiting school(s) or the FHSAA.
- (4) The net profit is determined by subtracting total expenditures from the gross gate receipts on the financial report form.
- (5) If a state series event on the district or regional level shows a net loss on the financial report form, the FHSAA shall compensate the host school up to \$350 for the loss, subject to the following provisions:
  - (a) The host school must charge the full admission price established;
- (b) The host school must sell numbered tickets and account for all tickets sold in the ticket manifest section of the financial report form, as stipulated;
- (c) The host school must file a financial report form for the meet within 21 calendar days of the completion of the meet as stipulated;
- (d) The host school must submit with the financial report form the "FHSAA State Series Contest Pass Gate Sign-In Form(s)" (Form AT10) as stipulated; and
  - (e) The host school must be in compliance with all policies for the event.
- (6) Compensation for expenses of schools competing in a state series is not guaranteed. Each participating school will be responsible to pay any and all expenses related to its team. Neither the FHSAA nor the host school/organization will assume responsibility for any participating school expenses of any kind.
- (7) The appropriate "FHSAA State Series Financial Report Form" (Forms FN3 & FN4) must be submitted by the host school so that it is received in the FHSAA Office, as well as by all participating schools, within 21 calendar days of the completion of the event. Payment of profit shares due participating schools and the FHSAA must be included with the report. Failure to file a financial report within the 21-day period, will result in the forfeiture of any reimbursement to which the host school is entitled. If this report is not received in the FHSAA Office within 30 calendar days, a late filing fee of \$50 will be assessed; within 60 days, \$75; and within 90 days, \$100. See FHSAA.org for "Guidelines on Filing of Financial Reports and Payment of Revenue Shares."
- **206.05 Delayed or Cancelled Contests.** If severe weather occurs in the area prior to the start of, or during any, scheduled outdoor game, tournament or meet and the event is delayed, postponed, suspended or cancelled, special rules apply. If for other unforeseen reasons, a game, tournament or meet is delayed, postponed, suspended or cancelled, special rules apply.
- (1) If tickets have been sold for the event and any revenue related to the event is retained by the school, then the regular financial reporting process must be completed with payments to the FHSAA and to the participating school(s). If free entry

is given for a future event, the revenue received and retained should be reported for the event. If money is refunded and not retained then it should not be included as revenue reported for the event. If tickets were presold for the event and the event was cancelled before it was to begin, then the revenue received and retained (not refunded) from the presold tickets should be reported on the financial report.

(2) If a financial hardship results from the inclement weather and the related loss of playing time, the host school should submit a written request for waiver of financial share payments. Requests should be submitted to the Senior Director of Athletics and Officials. Requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

## 207. Meet Regulations

#### 207.01 General.

- (1) **Track Surface.** A rubber or synthetic surface is preferred for all state series meets.
- (2) **Athletic Trainers.** The presence of a certified athletic trainer or medical staff is recommended for all state series meets.
  - (3) Squads.
- (a) <u>Scratched Contestant.</u> A contestant who is entered into an event in the FHSAA State Track & Field Series on any level and is later scratched from that event will be disqualified from participating in all remaining events in the meet and on succeeding levels
- (2) <u>Substitutions.</u> No substitution may be made for any individual in any event, other than relay events, who qualifies to participate in an event but is unable to compete. This applies to individuals who qualify from the district meet to the regional meet and from the regional meet to the FHSAA Finals, and between the prelims and the finals on any level.
- (3) <u>Relay Personnel</u>. Relay personnel may be changed between the district and regional meets, between the regional meet and the FHSAA Finals, and between the prelims and finals on any level as long as such change is made in compliance with procedures established by the meet director or games committee. Once relay personnel report to the Clerk of the Course for a race, no change in personnel for that race is permissible.
- (4) <u>Ties.</u> In field and running events, all ties in preliminaries which would result in more than eight qualifiers (nine qualifiers on nine-lane tracks in running events and nine qualifiers in field events at the state meet only) to the finals must be broken by a run-off, jump-off, throw-off, or appropriate National Federation rule tie-breaker procedure.

#### 207.02 District Meets.

- (1) **Number of Contestants.** The maximum number of contestants which a school may enter in a district meet is limited to four (4) contestants in each individual event and one (1) team in each relay event.
  - (2) Running Event Regulations.
- (a) Two contestants from the same school should not be placed in the same heat if at all possible.
  - (b) In events where heats are run against time, the fastest heat must be run last.
- (c) Each of the 1600m run and 3200m run must be conducted in one section with a staggered start around the first turn followed by a break for the pole.

- (d) Contestants in excess of the number of places to be awarded who are lapped in the 1600m run or 3200m run must drop out of the race.
  - (3) Field Event Regulations.
- (a) The three (3) best efforts of each contestant will be recorded in the shot put, discus, triple jump and long jump. The eight (8) contestants with the best performances in the prelims will advance to the finals where they will compete in one flight.
- (b) Contestants will be given a maximum of three (3) warmups prior to the trials in their flights. The three (3) preliminary trials will be taken in groups of eight in the order in which the contestants are listed for competition.
- (c) Competitors in the pole vault will be assigned in order as they appear on the event card to continuing flights of three until the field is cut to six or fewer competitors. A single rotation then will be followed for the balance of competition.
- (d) Scales must be provided for the purpose of weighing all shot put and discus implements.
- (e) Pole vault competitors are subject to verification of body weight to confirm the proper calibration of their vaulting poles.
- (f) Discus and shot put competitors must be supervised during warmups as well as competition.
  - (g) Use of a discus cage is mandatory.

#### 207.03 Regional Meets.

- (1) **Contestants.** Only those individuals and relay teams which qualify from their respective district meets are eligible to participate in the regional meets. Relay team personnel may be changed as stipulated in s.207.01(3).
  - (2) Running Event Regulations.
- (a) Preliminaries consisting of two heats each will be run in the 100m High Hurdles, the 110m High Hurdles, the 100m Dash, the 4x100m Relay, the 400m Dash (Classes 4A and 3A only), the 300m Low Hurdles, the 300m Intermediate Hurdles and the 200m Dash. Contestants in these events will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective district meet finals, and will be assigned to heats as follows: seeds 1, 4, 5, 8, 9, 12, 13 and 16 will be assigned to the first heat; seeds 2, 3, 6, 7, 10, 11, 14 and 15 will be assigned to the second heat. Contestants in each heat will be given lane assignments according to the spearhead method. Two contestants from the same school will not be placed in the same heat if possible. The best four performances from each preliminary heat will advance to the finals. Please refer to s. 105.02 for seeding finals in events with preliminaries.
- (b) The 800m Run, the 4x400m Relay and the 4x800m Relay will be contested in two heats run against time. The faster heat will be run last. The four first-place finishers and the next four fastest times in district competition will be assigned to the faster heat. Once the heats are determined, contestants will be assigned lanes according to the spearhead method.
- (c) The 1600m Run and the 3200m Run each will be contested in one section. Contestants in excess of the number of places to be awarded who are lapped will be permitted to finish the race, but must move to the outer lanes of the track (lane 3 or beyond).
- (d) Runners must start in the lanes to which they are assigned regardless of lanes vacated because of scratches

#### (3) Field Event Regulations.

- (a) Preliminaries consisting of two flights each will be conducted in the Long Jump, Triple Jump, Discus Throw and Shot Put. Contestants in these events will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective district meet finals, and will be assigned to flights as follows: seeds 1 through 8 will be assigned to the first flight and seeds 9-16 will be assigned to the second flight. The No. 1 seed will jump or throw first, followed by the No. 2 seed and continuing in numerical order through the No. 16 seed. Contestants will be given a maximum of three warm-up jumps or throws prior to competition in their flights. Competition in each flight will consist of three (3) preliminary trials. The three (3) efforts of each contestant will be recorded. The eight (8) contestants with the best performances in the prelims will advance to the finals where they will compete in one flight, with the eighth-best preliminary performer jumping or throwing first, followed in reverse numerical order by the seven remaining finalists with the best preliminary performer jumping or throwing last.
- (b) Contestants in the Pole Vault and High Jump will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective district meet finals. The No. 16 seed will vault or jump first, followed by the No. 15 seed and continuing in reverse numerical order with the No. 1 seed vaulting or jumping last. Competitors in the pole vault will be assigned to continuing flights of three until the field is cut to six or fewer competitors. A single rotation then will be followed for the balance of competition. The lowest qualifying height in the Pole Vault and High Jump from the district meets will be the starting height for competition in these events in the regional meet.
- (c) Scales must be provided for the purpose of weighing all shot put and discus implements.
- (d) Pole vault competitors are subject to verification of body weight to confirm the proper calibration of their vaulting poles.
- (e) Discus and shot put competitors must be supervised during warmups as well as competition.
  - (f) Use of a discus cage is mandatory.

#### 207.04 FHSAA Finals.

- (1) **Contestants.** Only those individuals and relay teams which qualify from their respective regional meets in each of the four classifications are eligible to participate in the FHSAA Finals. Relay team personnel may be changed as stipulated in s.207.01(3).
- (2) **Practice.** Practice by any participating school at the site of the FHSAA Finals during the week of the FHSAA Finals is prohibited.
- (3) **Participant Passes.** Schools will be issued participant passes only for coaches and student-athletes who qualify for participation in the FHSAA Finals. Schools with four or fewer participants will be issued two (2) passes for use by coaches; schools with five or more participants will be issued three (3) passes for use by coaches. Schools that abuse the pass procedure will subject themselves to a monetary penalty.
- (4) **Access to Track.** Contestants and officials only will be permitted within the track oval.
  - (5) Running Event Regulations.
  - (a) Preliminaries consisting of two heats each will be run in the 100m High

Hurdles, the 110m High Hurdles, the 100m Dash, the 4x100m Relay, the 400m Dash (Classes 4A and 3A only), the 300m Low Hurdles, the 300m Intermediate Hurdles and the 200m Dash. Contestants in these events will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective regional meet finals, and will be assigned to heats as follows: seeds 1, 4, 5, 8, 9, 12, 13 and 16 will be assigned to the first heat; seeds 2, 3, 6, 7, 10, 11, 14 and 15 will be assigned to the second heat. Contestants in each heat will be given lane assignments according to the spearhead method. The top three finishers in each preliminary heat as well as the next three fastest times will advance to the finals. Only eight places will score and be awarded medallions. When assigning lanes to qualifiers, heat winners will be assigned to lanes 5 and 6 on a nine-lane track or lanes 4 and 5 on an eight-lane track (see s. 105.02).

- (b) The 800m Run, the 400m Dash (Classes 2A and 1A only), the 4x400m Relay and the 4x800m Relay will be contested in two heats run against time. Nine places will be placed in the fast heat and seven in the slow heat. The faster heat will be run last. The four first-place finishers and the next five fastest times in regional competition will be assigned to the faster heat. Once the heats are determined, contestants will be assigned lanes according to the spearhead method.
- (c) The 1600m Run and the 3200m Run each will be contested in one section from a staggered start. Two runners will be assigned to each lane. Contestants must remain in their starting lanes through the first curve, after which they may break for the pole on the back straight-away. The break point must be marked by flags or cones. Contestants in excess of the number of places to be awarded who are lapped will be permitted to finish the race, but must move to the outer lanes of the track (lane 3 or beyond).
- (d) The 4x100m Relay will be run the entire distance in the assigned lanes from a staggered start.
- (e) The 4x400m Relay will be run from a staggered start. The first runner must stay in his/her lane the entire distance with the first exchange being made in the assigned lane. The second runner must remain in the assigned lane through the first curve, after which he/she may break for the pole on the back straight-away.
- (f) Runners must start in the lanes to which they are assigned regardless of lanes vacated because of scratches.
- (g) Official FHSAA State Track & Field Records may be set only at the FHSAA Finals. Fully Automatic Timing (FAT) will be used for the official timing for all running events. Hand-held watches will be used as a backup. FAT systems that generate photos may be used to determine place winners.

## (6) Field Event Regulations.

(a) Preliminaries consisting of two flights each will be conducted in the Long Jump, Triple Jump, Discus Throw and Shot Put. Contestants in these events will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective regional meet finals, and will be assigned to flights as follows: seeds 1 through 8 will be assigned to the first flight and seeds 9-16 will be assigned to the second flight. Regional champions will receive preferred positions when entry performances are tied among contestants. The No. 1 seed will jump or throw first, followed by the No. 2 seed and continuing in numerical order through the No. 16 seed. Contestants will be given a maximum of three warm-up jumps or throws prior to competition in their flights. Competition in each flight will consist of three (3) preliminary trials. The three (3) efforts of each

contestant will be recorded. The nine (9) contestants with the best performances in the prelims will advance to the finals where they will compete in one flight, with the ninth-best preliminary performer jumping or throwing first, followed in reverse numerical order by the eight remaining finalists with the best preliminary performer jumping or throwing last. Only eight places will score and be awarded medallions.

- (b) Contestants in the Pole Vault and High Jump will be seeded 1 through 16 according to their performances in their respective regional meet finals. Regional champions will receive preferred positions when entry performances are tied among contestants. The No. 16 seed will vault or jump first, followed by the No. 15 seed and continuing in reverse numerical order with the No. 1 seed vaulting or jumping last. Competitors in the pole vault will be assigned to continuing flights of three until the field is cut to six or fewer competitors. A single rotation then will be followed for the balance of competition. The lowest qualifying height in the Pole Vault and High Jump from the regional meets will be the starting height for competition in these events in the FHSAA Finals.
- (c) Scales must be provided for the purpose of weighing all shot put and discus implements.
- (d) Pole vault competitors are subject to verification of body weight to confirm the proper calibration of their vaulting poles.
- (e) Discus and shot put competitors must be supervised during warmups as well as competition.
  - (f) Use of a discus cage is mandatory.

### 207.04 Jury of Appeals.

- (1) A Jury of Appeals consisting of five coaches from five different participating schools shall be appointed by the meet manager for each meet in the state series. A maximum of five alternate jurors shall also be appointed. A Jury of Appeals consisting of five members is mandatory. There can be no decision rendered without five jurors.
  - (2) Jurors for the FHSAA Finals shall be chosen as follows:
- (a) A list of recommended jurors will be compiled by the FACA State Track & Field chairperson and submitted to the FHSAA for approval. Any coach not on the "approved" list cannot serve on a Jury of Appeals at the FHSAA Finals.
- (b) Diversity in school classification, gender and geography, as well as knowledge and experience, must be taken into consideration when a Jury of Appeals is selected.
- (3) A member of the Jury of Appeals whose team or individual contestant is a party to an appeal must recuse himself/herself and be replaced until the appeal is concluded.
- (4) The head coach of a team who wishes to file an appeal must do so in writing. The appeals process will adhere to NFHS Case Book guidelines.
- (5) The decision of the Jury of Appeals shall be final. The Jury of Appeals cannot set aside any rule.
- **207.05 Failure to Compete.** A student-athlete who qualifies in a state series meet is expected to compete on successive levels of the state series unless ill, injured, suspended due to disciplinary action, or for any other reason acceptable to the Commissioner. A school must submit in writing to the FHSAA Office the name of the student-athlete and an explanation for the inability to compete in advance of the competition whenever situations make it possible to do so.

#### 208. State Series Policies

**208.01 Administration and Management.** As specified in Bylaw 4.1.4, all state series shall be conducted in accordance with the policies established by the Board of Directors and shall be under the control, direction and supervision of the FHSAA Office.

**208.02 Enforcement of Rules & Policies.** Participating schools shall adhere to all regulations and policies governing the state series.

The determination of the host school for each event shall be conditioned in part on the school's willingness to comply with and enforce regulations and policies governing the event. This includes financial terms, as well as licensing and merchandising policies. A school that does not comply with and enforce such regulations and policies shall forfeit its opportunity to serve as host.

**208.03 Neutrality.** It is the responsibility of the host school to ensure that an atmosphere of neutrality is maintained in all state series events. Such events are not "home contests" for the host schools. Special festivities held as part of, or in conjunction with, regular season home contests (i.e., pregame activities designed to rally support for the home team, such as light shows, or give special recognition to members of the home team) are not permitted during the state series.

**208.04 Forfeitures and Vacations of Brackets, Standings.** Individuals or teams that are eliminated from state series competition by defeat by individuals or teams that later are ordered to forfeit their victory, place and/or points, are not reinstated and do not advance in the state series competition from which they were eliminated by defeat.

If championships or other placements in state series competitions are ordered vacated by individuals or teams, other individuals or teams neither advance to those placements nor receive awards for those placements.

#### 208.05 Passes.

- FHSAA State Series Passes, FHSAA Lifetime Passes and legitimate news media credentials ONLY will be honored for complimentary admission to state series events.
- (2) FHSAA State Series Passes issued to member schools may only be issued to and used by those individuals who are directly connected to the schools' athletic departments (i.e. coaches, athletic director, athletic secretary, etc.). A state series pass issued to an individual may only be used by the individual in whose name it is issued. Member schools must not issue state series passes to students or other individuals under the age of 18. Use of state series passes by students or other individuals under the age of 18 is prohibited. Users of state series passes must present a valid government-issued photo ID (i.e., drivers license) with the pass to gain admittance. A state series pass admits only the bearer. Individuals accompanying the bearer of a state series pass who themselves do not possess a pass must purchase a ticket of admission to the event. State series event managers are instructed to confiscate and return to the FHSAA Office any state series pass that is misused.
- (3) Visiting school administrators (i.e., principal, FHSAA representative, assistant principals and athletic director) who are required by their principal to attend the event for supervisory purposes shall be admitted upon presentation of a photo I.D., provided the visiting school submits their names to the event manager by fax in writing on school stationery not less than 24 hours prior to the scheduled starting time of

the event.

- (4) All individuals who gain admittance to a state series event using any one of the accepted passes must record their name, position with school or organization, type of pass used, and pass number (if applicable) on the "FHSAA State Series Event Pass Gate Log" (Form AT10). This pass gate log must be submitted to the FHSAA Office with the financial report.
- **208.07 Signs and/or Banners.** The display of signs, banners, placards or similar items at matches in the state series is permitted, provided:
- (1) They are in good taste and reflect good sportsmanship in their message and use;
- (2) They reflect identification and encouragement to participants and their school or community, and make no reference to the opposing team, its school, players or community;
- (3) They are not displayed on the court/field, or in a manner which interferes with play;
  - (4) They do not obstruct the view of participants or spectators; and
  - (5) They are not safety hazards.
- **208.08** Licensing and Merchandising. The FHSAA owns or controls all rights and interests in its name, logos, trademarks and service marks, whether registered or unregistered, including the official event logo for all FHSAA Finals events. The sale of items bearing any of these marks by a member school or organization without the written consent of the FHSAA is prohibited.

The FHSAA retains the exclusive right to produce and sell souvenir products (apparel and otherwise) at all games, tournaments and meets held as part of the state series; host schools/organizations are required to sell items provided by the official FHSAA event souvenir merchandiser.

The official FHSAA event souvenir merchandiser is Team IP Sportswear, Inc., of Port St. Lucie. Team IP may be reached by phone at (877) 821-8643. Team IP has been awarded exclusive souvenir merchandising rights to all state series events on the district, regional and FHSAA Finals levels in all sports. A host school/organization that desires to sell souvenir merchandise at a state series event must purchase such merchandise from Team IP. No other vendor shall be permitted to produce such merchandise. Team IP shall have the right to go on-property and sell souvenir merchandise at the site of any state series event. The host school/organization of a state series event shall grant Team IP access to its property for the event.

No individual(s), including those affiliated with a participating member school, shall bring onto the property of a facility at which an FHSAA State Series event is being conducted any items (including but not limited to T-shirts, caps, posters, bumper stickers, etc.) to be sold or otherwise distributed on the property to student-athletes, coaches or spectators without the written approval of the FHSAA. An individual(s) found in violation of this provision shall surrender the items for confiscation, shall be expelled from the property and may be subject to legal action. A member school found in violation of this provision shall be assessed a minimum fine of \$250 and, in addition, shall pay monetary damages to be mutually determined by the FHSAA and its exclusive vendor(s).

The host school/organization of a state series event may be permitted to sell generic merchandise unrelated to the event (i.e., apparel and other merchandise bear-

ing the host school/organization's mark), provided such merchandise has been made available for sale on a consistent basis throughout the year and has not been produced specifically for sale at the state series event.

- **208.09 Souvenir Programs.** All host schools of district tournaments/ meets and regional tournaments/meets that produce an official program must display on the program cover both the appropriate FHSAA sport logo and sportsmanship logo, which may be downloaded from FHSAA.org If the program cover is preprinted, the logos must be displayed prominently inside or on the team roster inserts.
- **208.10 Public-Address Announcer.** The public-address announcer shall be considered a bench official for all state series events. He/she shall maintain complete neutrality at all times and, as such, shall not be a "cheerleader" for any team. The announcer will follow the FHSAA script for promotional announcements, player introductions and awards ceremonies. Other announcements are limited to:
  - Those of an emergency nature (e.g., paging a doctor, lost child or parent, etc.);
- Those of a "practical" nature (e.g., announcing that a driver has left his/her vehicle lights on); and
- Announcements that FHSAA souvenir merchandise, souvenir programs and concessions are on sale in the facility.

During the contest, the announcer:

- Should recognize players about to attempt a play (e.g., coming up to bat in baseball, punting, kicking or receiving a punt or kick in football, serving in volleyball, etc.);
- Should recognize player(s) making a play (e.g., "Basket by Jones" in basketball, "Smith on the kill" in volleyball, etc.);
  - Should report a penalty as signaled by the referee;
  - Should report substitutions and timeouts;
- Must not call the "play-by-play" or provide "color commentary" as if he/she were announcing for a radio or television broadcast;
- Must not make any comment that would offer either competing team an unfair advantage in the contest; and
- Must not make any comment critical of any school, team, player, coach or official; or any other comment that has the potential to incite unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any individual.

The announcer should be certain of the accuracy of his/her statements before making them. When in doubt, the announcer should remain silent.

**208.11 Public-Address Announcements.** Announcements promoting the FHSAA and its interscholastic programs must be read over the public-address system, if available, prior to and during all contests in the state series. See the "Promotions and Programs" page on FHSAA.org for the appropriate script.

## 208.12 Photography and Videotaping.

(1) The FHSAA, subject to the policies of the host facility, allows still cameras and video cameras to be used at state series events so that participants and spectators may record the excitement and festivities for their own personal entertainment – not for the purposes of commercial re-sale or public re-distribution in any form. Only those duly authorized organizations or individuals who have been granted appropriate rights by contract or by issued credential shall be permitted to sell or publicly display

or otherwise redistribute images and sounds of state series contests and then only in accordance with the terms and conditions established by the FHSAA.

- (2) Each participating school shall be permitted to photograph, film or videotape, for archival, coaching or instructional purposes, only those state series contests in which its team or contestants perform when arrangements are made with the contest management. Photographers, videographers and their equipment must be positioned so that they do not block the view of any spectator.
- (3) Spectators may be allowed to bring handheld video cameras that operate on battery power into the facility. Spectators shall be prohibited from using tripods.
- (4) There may be additional guidelines or restrictions for FHSAA Finals state championship events.
- (5) A school that violates these guidelines shall be guilty of unsportsmanlike conduct and will be subject to reprimand and the assessment of a financial penalty by the FHSAA. An organization or individual who violates these guidelines, and in so doing infringes upon the rights of the FHSAA, shall be subject to one or more of the following actions: remedies under breach of contract; revocation of credentials; expulsion from the site of competition; and legal action under applicable state and federal laws.
- **208.13 All-Tournament/Meet Teams.** No employee of the FHSAA nor the local manager may influence in any way the selection of any all-tournament/meet team, including the selection of a most valuable player or other "player of the game."
- **208.14 Uniformed Security.** The local manager for a state series event is responsible for providing appropriate uniformed security at the event that his/her school is hosting.
- **208.15** Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs). The presence and availability of an automated external defibrillator (AED) is mandatory at the site of every FHSAA state championship series contest on the district, regional, sectional and state levels.

#### 209. Media Policies

### 209.01 Admission and Seating.

- (1) **District and Regional Meets.** Media representatives covering a state series event must be admitted free of charge upon presentation of proper news media identification. Space must be set aside to provide for news media representatives whether they be from newspapers, radio stations, commercial television stations and/or cable television stations.
- (2) **FHSAA Finals.** News media representatives planning to cover the FHSAA Finals state championship meet must secure credentials as instructed by the FHSAA Office, according to the FHSAA Policy on Media Credentials. Requests for credentials should be submitted to the FHSAA Office not later than 5 p.m. EST Monday, Apr. 24, 2006 for Class 1A and Class 2A meets, and 5 p.m. EST Monday, May 1, 2006 for Class 3A and Class 4A meets. Only those representatives requesting credentials by the deadline will be guaranteed seating and informational materials at the meet.
- (3) **Student Media.** Each school participating in an FHSAA Finals event may request up to three (3) credentials for use by student media (i.e., student newspaper, yearbook, TV/video yearbook) who will be covering the school's participation in the event. These credentials may be issued only to and used only by students.

- **209.02 Media Rights.** The FHSAA owns all media rights to its state series events, including rights to radio broadcasts, telecasts, cablecasts, webcasts, audio and film/video rights, and commercial photography. Radio broadcasts, telecasts, cablecasts and webcasts of state series events are governed by the FHSAA Broadcast Policy. Such broadcasts, telecasts, cablecasts and webcasts must be approved by the FHSAA Office. The following provisions shall apply.
- (1) The "Application for Media Rights to FHSAA State Series Event" (Form AT11) to the FHSAA Office by 3 p.m. EST on the business day preceding the event to be broadcast, telecast, or cablecast to avoid a \$25.00 late filing fee.
- (2) Radio broadcast rights fees are \$50.00 per event. Tape-delay telecast and cablecast rights fees are \$250.00 per event. Rights fees for live telecasts and cablecasts shall be negotiated at the discretion of the FHSAA. The FHSAA Office shall invoice the outlet to which rights are granted. Rights fees must be paid by company check made payable to "FHSAA" and mailed directly to the FHSAA Office within 30 days of receipt of the invoice. Outlets that fail to make payment of rights fees by the deadline shall be assessed a \$25.00 late fee and may be denied rights to broadcast, telecast or cablecast future contests.
- (3) The FHSAA Radio Network owns exclusive rights to the radio broadcast of all FHSAA Finals state championship events. Sun Sports Network owns exclusive rights to the telecast and cablecast of all FHSAA Finals state championship events. iHigh Inc. owns exclusive rights to the webcast of all state series events.
- (4) Approval of radio broadcasts, telecasts and cablecasts of state series contests by the FHSAA Office are final. The FHSAA Office shall fax to the host school a copy of the approved media rights agreement. A host school shall not permit the radio broadcast, telecast or cablecast of a state series contest that has not been approved by the FHSAA Office.

### 209.03 Post-Competition Procedures.

- (1) **District and Regional Meets.** The host school should cooperate with news media representatives in providing them access to a work area and telephone following a state series contest so that they can file their reports on the contest. The local manager also is encouraged to designate a specific area in which interviews are to be conducted. It is recommended the area be covered and that liquid refreshment be provided for the coaches and athletes participating in interviews. The head coach of each competing team is required to cooperate with the news media by participating in interviews as quickly as possible following the conclusion of the contest and providing contest statistics/results if available. Participation by athletes in interviews is voluntary and at the discretion of the head coach.
- (2) **FHSAA Finals.** A specific area in which interviews are to be conducted shall be established near the finish line. The area shall be covered and liquid refreshment shall be provided for the coaches and athletes participating in interviews.

#### 209.04 Restrictions.

- (1) **Access to Locker/Dressing Rooms.** The FHSAA operates under a closed lockerroom policy at all FHSAA Finals state championship events. At no time will news media representatives be granted access to lockerrooms or dressing rooms at any state championship event. Team boxes, team benches, team huddles and dugouts are considered extensions of locker/dressing rooms.
  - (2) Access to Competition Area. Media representatives are not permitted

in the competition area (i.e., within the field of play, on the playing court, etc.) at any time during a state series contest until the competition has concluded and a winner has been determined. Photographers shall honor photographer lines and designated areas when marked.

#### 210. Awards

#### 210.01 Team Awards.

- (1) **District Meets.** Trophies are available for awarding to the champion and runner-up teams, and may be purchased from the FHSAA's authorized vendor by the host school or district as an expense of the meet as determined by those school representatives present at the district meeting, or individually by the champion and runner-up schools. There shall be no other team awards presented by outside organizations or individuals.
- (2) **Regional Meets.** Championship trophies shall be purchased from the FHSAA's authorized vendor in advance by the host school for presentation to the girls and boys team champions at the conclusion of the meet. The cost of the trophies shall be deducted as an expense from the meet receipts. Runner-up trophies are available for purchase by the runner-up schools from the FHSAA's authorized vendor. There shall be no other team awards presented by outside organizations or individuals.
- (3) **FHSAA Finals.** Trophies will be awarded to the champion and runner-up in each class in the FHSAA Finals. There shall be no other team awards presented by outside organizations or individuals. In the event of a tie for champion, co-champions shall be declared and no runner-up trophy will be awarded.
- (4) **FHSAA Authorized Vendor.** Trophies must be ordered from The Trophy Shop in Gainesville by calling (352) 372-8551. The vendor should also be contacted if problems are experienced in receiving trophies on time and in good condition.

#### 210.02 Individual Awards.

- (1) **District and Regional Meets.** Ribbons to be awarded to the first eight placing individuals or relay teams will be furnished to the host school by the FHSAA Office. There will be no other individual awards presented by any organization or individual
- (2) **FHSAA Finals.** Medallions to be awarded to the first eight placing (finishing) individuals and relay teams in each event in each class will be furnished to the host school by the FHSAA Office. Medallions to be awarded members of the champion and runner-up teams also will be provided. There will be no other individual awards presented by any organization or individual.

## 210.03 Awards Ceremony.

- (1) **District and Regional Meets.** Formal awards ceremonies may be conducted following the conclusion of district and regional meets at the discretion of the respective meet managers.
- (2) **FHSAA Finals.** A formal awards ceremony will be conducted at the FHSAA Finals at 9:30 p.m.

#### 211. Officials

## 211.01 Assignment.

(1) **District Tournaments.** Official crews for each district meet shall be selected at the district meeting. No high school student shall be permitted to work as

- a "lead official" in any event.
- (2) **Regional Tournaments.** Official crews for regional meets shall be selected by the local director. Referees must be FHSAA-registered track & field officials, unless this provision is waived by the Commissioner at the request of the local director. No high school student shall be permitted to work as a "lead official" in any event.
- (3) **FHSAA Finals.** Officials for the FHSAA Finals shall be assigned by the meet director. At least one FHSAA-registered official, if available, shall be assigned to each event. Referees must be FHSAA-registered track & field officials, unless this provision is waived by the Commissioner at the request of the meet director.

#### **211.02 Payment.**

- (1) **District Meets.** The host school for each district meet shall be responsible for paying meet officials from the total revenue of the tournament according to the financial terms stipulated in s.206.01(2).
- (2) **Regional Meets.** The host school for each regional meet shall be responsible for paying meet officials from the total revenue of the tournament or game according to the financial terms stipulated in s.206.02(2). Meet referees shall receive a fee of \$50. Sixty (60) cents per mile, per vehicle, one way is the maximum mileage rate.
- (3) **FHSAA Finals.** The FHSAA Office shall be responsible for paying meet officials assigned to work the FHSAA Finals.

## Appendix A FHSAA Eligibility Rules-in-Brief

Coaches must understand that these rules-in-brief are general statements only. Complete eligibility rules are contained in Article 11 of the FHSAA Bylaws. See your principal or athletic director if you have questions or need further explanation of details and exceptions.

To be eligible to represent your school in interscholastic athletics, a student-athlete:

- 1. Must be regularly enrolled and in regular attendance at your school. If the student is a home education student or attend a charter school that is not a member of the FHSAA, the student must declare in writing his/her intention to participate in athletics to the school at which he/she is permitted to participate prior to the first day of practice. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.1)
- 2. Must enroll in school within 10 days of the beginning of each semester to be eligible during that semester. If not, the student must make up all work missed and be in attendance a minimum of one day for each day missed due to late enrollment before your principal can declare the student eligible. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.1)
- 3. Must maintain a cumulative 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 unweighted scale through the end of the previous semester as required by Florida Statutes. This GPA must include all courses taken since the student entered high school. Sixth-graders, seventh-graders and eighth-graders must have been regularly promoted from the previous grade, carry a normal class load, do satisfactory classroom work and maintain a satisfactory conduct record. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.2)
- 4. Must not have graduated from any high school or its equivalent. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.2)
- 5. Must participate at the school in which the student first enrolls, or at which the student first takes part in an athletic practice, at the beginning of the school year. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.3)
- 6. Must transfer from his/her previous school prior to the first day of practice and secure an "Application for Waiver of the Transfer Rule" signed by the principal of both the previous school attended and your school. If the student transfers on or after the first day of practice in a sport the student cannot participate in that sport. If the student transfers from a school at which he/she was ineligible because of disciplinary action or unsatisfactory conduct, the student will be ineligible at your school for one full semester. If the student participates on a non-school team (i.e. AAU, American Legion, club settings, etc.) that is affiliated with or coached by a coach from a school other than the one the student attends, or has attended, and then enrolls in that school, it will be assumed the student has been recruited to attend that school or transferred to that school for athletic reasons and the student will be ineligible there for one year. If the student transfers to a school that his/her coach has relocated to within the past

year, it will be assumed the student transferred to that school for athletic reasons and he/she will be ineligible there for one year. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.4)

- 7. Must not have enrolled in the ninth grade more than four school years ago. If the student is a sixth-grader, seventh-grader or eighthgrader, he/she must not have participated in an earlier school year in the grade in which he/she is currently enrolled. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.5)
- 8. Must be less than 19 years 9 months old to participate in high school; 16 years 9 months old to participate in junior high school; and 15 years 9 months old to participate in middle school. On the day the student reaches one of these ages regardless of when that day is the student will become ineligible to participate on that level. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.6)
- 9. Must get signed permission to participate from his/her parents or guardian on a form provided by the school. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.7)
- 10. Must undergo a physical evaluation and be certified as being physically fit for interscholastic athletic competition. The physical evaluation form is valid for one calendar year from the date of the practitioner's signature. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.8)
- 11. Must be an amateur. This means the student must not accept money, gift or donation for participating in a sport, or use a name other than his/her own when participating. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.9)
- 12. Must not participate in an all-star contest in a sport prior to completing his/her high school eligibility in that sport. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.10)
- 13. Must display good sportsmanship and follow the rules of competition before, during and after every contest in which he/she participates. If not, the student may be suspended from participation for a period of time. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.11)
- 14. Must not provide false information to his/her school or to the FHSAA to gain eligibility. (FHSAA Bylaw 11.12)

## Appendix B NFHS Interstate/International Sanctioning Procedures

NOTE: The interscholastic community urges event sponsors to schedule interstate competition in a manner that minimizes the amount of time student participants will be absent from the regular school day.

#### 1. Events that Require NFHS Sanctioning.

- (a) Any interstate event involving two (2) or more schools which is co-sponsored by or titled in the name of an organization outside the high school community (e.g., a university, a theme park, an athletic shoe/apparel company). Competition involving bordering states, and all other configurations of interstate competition not requiring the sanction of the NFHS office, shall be sanctioned by the state associations involved according to their own procedures.
- (b) Non-bordering events if five (5) or more states are involved.
- (c) Non-bordering events if more than eight (8) schools are involved.
- (d) Any event involving two (2) or more schools that involves a team from a foreign country. The host school should complete the international sanction application. (The exceptions to this rule are Canada and Mexico which are considered "bordering states.")
- 2. <u>Request for Sanction.</u> Only a member school of an NFHS member state association, or a school approved by such an association, or such an association itself, is eligible to request sanctioning through the NFHS Interstate Sanctioning Program. Any event seeking NFHS sanction must be sponsored by a member high school, approved high school or state association.
- 3. <u>Interstate Competition.</u> Interstate competition occurs when either teams or individuals who represent their schools travel across state lines to participate in competitive sports events, including but not limited to such events as "shoot-outs," "showcases," "round-robin tournaments," etc. Subject to Paragraph 3, no sanction is required from the NFHS office if all competing schools, regardless of the number of competing schools, are from states that border the host state.
- 4. <u>Timelines/Fees</u>. This application for sanction should be sent to the state association of the host school ninety (90) calendar days or more prior to the event and must be accompanied by the host schools processing fee of \$100, check or money order, per application made payable to the NFHS. Do not send cash. The sanction application must be received in the NFHS office sixty (60) calendar days or more prior to the event. The late fee for any application that arrives in the NFHS office 15-59 calendar days prior the event will be \$50 for a total of \$150. If the application arrives in the NFHS office less than 15 calendar days prior the event, the late fee will be \$150 plus a \$50 penalty for not forwarding the final list of actual entries for a total application fee of \$300. The penalty fee for not forwarding the final list of actual entries to the NFHS office twenty (20) calendar days prior to the event will be \$50. If the NFHS does not receive the late fees within five (5) calendar days prior to the event, the event will not be sanctioned, and the meet director will be notified they

**are running a non-sanctioned event.** There is no processing fee for International Athletic Competition applications.

- 5. Names and Addresses of Invited/Participating Schools. All sanction requests submitted to the NFHS office must be accompanied by the names and addressses of all invited/participating schools. In the case of cross country and track & field events, the host school will complete the sanction application and forward it to the host state association office so that it will arrive at the NFHS office 60 days or more prior to the event. The list of schools will be due to the NFHS office ten (10) days prior to the event. If the list is not received ten (10) days prior to the event, the application for sanction will be disapproved, and the meet director will be notified that they are running a non-sanctioned event.
- 6. **Equal Treatment.** Schools participating in interstate competition, as well as the schools' employees and agents, shall be treated equally. Examples of such shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
- (a) reduction or waiver of entry fee for one school must result in a reduction or waiver of entry fee for all schools;
- (b) appearance fee paid to one school must result in an equal amount of appearance fee paid to all participating schools;
- (c) expense reimbursements, if any, must result in equivalent payments to all participating schools, subject to reasonable adjustments for differing distances traveled;
- (d) share of proceeds/gate paid to one school must result in equal share of proceeds/gate paid to all participating schools.

NFHS Bylaw 17 provides that each member state association shall approve and receive NFHS approval for competition by a member school against a school from a foreign country, except for two (2) school and three (3) school competition with a school or schools from Canada or Mexico which necessitates a round trip of less than 600 miles.

- 7. NFHS Web Site. Information regarding the status of an event that has requested NFHS Sanctioning will be posted at www.nfhs.org/sanctioning.htm. If you have any questions regarding the status of your event, please contact the NFHS Sanctioning Department at (317) 972-6900 Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Eastern Time.
- 8. **Financial Report.** When NFHS sanction is required, the host school shall submit a financial report about the event to the NFHS on the accompanying form within ninety (90) calendar days of the completion of the event. The FHSAA Office will provide the host school/organization with the appropriate NFHS financial report form once the event has been sanctioned.

If a state association, rather than a school, sponsors or cosponsors the event, it should submit the financial report. For additional financial report forms, contact your state high school association or the NFHS.

## **Appendix C**

## Guidelines for Filing of Financial Reports and Payment of Revenue Shares

#### WHO MUST FILE?

Financial Report forms must be filed by the host for all preseason and regular season sanctioned events for which you are required to file an application for approval (sanction) with the FHSAA Office in the sanctioned sports of cross country, football, swimming & diving, track & field and boys weightlifting. Financial Report forms must be filed in these sports even if there was no revenue from the event. Forms are not filed in the sanctioned sports of baseball, basketball, golf, soccer, softball, girls volleyball, tennis and wrestling or in the recognized sports of bowling, flag football, boys volleyball, water polo and girls weightlifting. Financial Report forms must be filed for all FHSAA State Series events hosted by your school in all sports.

#### WHERE DO I LOCATE FORMS AND WHAT DO I ATTACH?

Forms are located on the FHSAA web site. For district and regional events, the FHSAA State Series Event Pass Gate Log (Form AT9) must be attached to the financial report form before filing with the FHSAA.

## WHEN ARE REPORTS AND PAYMENTS DUE AND ARE THERE PENALTIES FOR LATE FILING?

Reports must be received in the FHSAA Office no later than three weeks (21 calendar days) from the date of the event. Payment is required along with the report. Financial Report forms received and/or paid more than 30 days from the event date will be subject to a late filing/payment fee of \$50, more than 60 days a \$75 late fee, and more than 90 days a \$100 late fee.

#### WHAT ARE THE RULES REGARDING THE CHARGING OF ADMISSION?

- Preseason & Spring Jamborees: The admission price in all sports shall be determined by the host school.
- Preseason & Spring Classics: The admission price in all sports with the exception of football shall be determined by the host school.
- Invitational Tournaments & Meets: The admission price in all sports shall be determined by the host school.
- District & Regional Events: Admission must be charged to all district and regional events in the amount specified in the FHSAA Handbook and sport specific manuals. If the admission price charged is different from what is required in the FHSAA Handbook and sport specific manuals, written approval is required by the Commissioner or his/her designee in advance of the event.

The "Financial Reporting and Accounting Page" on the FHSAA web site (www.fhsaa.org/finance) has a schedule that lists admission price requirements in all sports.

## HOW DO I CALCULATE LOSS REIMBURSEMENTS

#### (District and Regional Events Only)

Step 1: Complete the Financial Report form, calculating Total Gate Receipts and

Total Expenses. (Excluding FHSAA share.)

- Step 2: Calculate Net Profit or Net Loss (total gate receipts less total expenses). (Excluding FHSAA share.)
- Step 3: If Net Profit is \$250 or less: host keeps all profit; no disbursement to FHSAA; and no disbursement to visitor(s).

If Net Profit is greater than \$250: pay FHSAA share according to Financial Report form; pay visitor(s) according to Financial Report form; payments to FHSAA and visitors are a percentage of total gate receipts, not net revenue.

If Net Loss is \$350 or less: no disbursement to FHSAA; no disbursement to visitor(s); host school will receive reimbursement from FHSAA for net loss.

If Net Loss is greater than \$350: no disbursement to FHSAA; no disbursement to visitor(s); will receive reimbursement from FHSAA for \$350.

The reimbursement from the FHSAA for losses should be shared with visiting school(s) if an agreement was made in advance to share in a loss from the event.

To receive any reimbursement to which it is entitled:

- 1. The host school must charge the required admission price;
- 2. The host school must sell numbered tickets and account for all tickets sold in the ticket manifest section of the financial report form;
- 3. The host school must file a financial report form so that it is received in the FHSAA Office within 21 calendar days of the completion of the event;
- 4. The host school must submit with the financial report form the FHSAA State Series Contest Pass Gate Log(s); and
  - 5. The host school must be in compliance with all policies for the event.

Refunds of less than \$5 will not be made. Shortages of less than \$5 will not be collected.
